

**Note to Teacher:** This lesson encompasses values—i.e., "core beliefs that guide and motivate attitudes and actions" (www.ethics.org). It offers the teacher guidelines to follow after students have viewed the SASO VIDEO entitled *Character. Own it.* which features Jessica Harlee (Values).

Discussion questions, scenarios, and suggestions for writing and speaking assignments have been designed to develop student critical thinking, reflection, interaction, and creativity. They are interchangeable and should be determined by the teacher.

With regard to discussion questions and scenarios, teachers may pose questions to students individually or in small groups. With regard to the latter, a spokesperson for each group should be selected to summarize his or her group's discussion to the rest of the class.

## **Discussion Questions:**

- 1. How do you define values?
- 2. What are examples of values?
- 3. Where do values come from?
- 4. Are values important to you?
- 5. Are you taught about values in school? How?
- 6. Are you taught about values at home? How?
- 7. How can you tell if someone has good values?
- 8. Discuss someone in the media (e.g., celebrity) who is known for his/her good values?
- 9. Discuss someone in the media (e.g., celebrity) is known from his/her lack of values?
- 10. If your friend's values differ from yours, is your friend a bad person?
- 11. Should schools reinforce actions based on good values? How?
- 12. Should schools regulate actions based on poor values? How?
- 13. Do you think you can be a positive example to others because of your values? How?
- 14. What are some things you can do in your school to promote good values? How?
- 15. Who is your role model for good values?

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## **Scenarios: What would you do?**

- 1. You are planning to see a movie with a group of friends. Once you get to the movie theatre, your find out that they want to buy tickets to the movie you thought you were going to see but sneak into an R-rated movie instead. What would you do?
- 2. When the teacher left the room, many of your classmates started making fun of one of the students in your class. What would you do
- 3. You really want a new shirt from your favorite store, but you don't have the money to buy it. Your friends tell you how to steal the shirt without getting caught. What would you do?
- 4. You forgot to do your homework and your friend offers his for you to copy. What would you do?

## <u>Writing/Speaking Assignments</u>: Students either may write a paper or give an oral presentation about the topic (length and guidelines to be determined by the teacher).

- 1. Define values in your own words and give examples to explain your definition.
- 2. Describe someone you know who has good values.
- 3. Discuss whether or not you think your generation has similar values to your parents' and/or grandparents' generation.
- 4. Interview your family members and/or friends, and ask them how they define values and which values are important to them.
- 5. Discuss your values and how you came to have those values.
- 6. Discuss why different people may have different sets of values.
- 7. Discuss whether or not it is easy to make decisions based on your values.
- 8. Discuss how you think a stranger would describe your values after observing you for a day.
- 9. Discuss whether or not a person's values influence his/her actions?
- 10. Discuss what values you want to be known for.
- 11. Discuss a well-known person who is known for his/her values.
- 12. Discuss a well-known person who is known for his/her lack of values.
- 13. Discuss how values reflect the environment in which you grew up.
- 14. Write a nonfiction or fiction story about values.
- 15. Write a poem or song about values.
- 16. Select one of the quotes related to values and learn what it means. Or, find a quotation about

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values and learning what it means. Identify the author of the quote and describe who that individual is (e.g., Abraham Lincoln, 16<sup>th</sup> President of the United States).
