

**Note to Teacher:** This lesson encompasses one of the Six Pillars of Character: Responsibility. Specifically, it focuses on duty and accountability. It offers the teacher guidelines to follow after students have viewed the SASO DVD of Alex Ruoff (*Volume I: Courage and Responsibility*) and the SASO VIDEO (*Character. Own it.*) which features PJ Shirdan (Courage).

Discussion questions, scenarios, and suggestions for writing and speaking assignments have been designed to develop student critical thinking, reflection, interaction, and creativity. They are interchangeable and should be determined by the teacher.

With regard to discussion questions and scenarios, teachers may pose questions to students individually or to small groups. With regard to the latter, a spokesperson for each group should be selected to summarize discussion to the rest of the class.

## **Discussion Questions:**

- 1. What is courage? Give examples.
- 2. What is responsibility?
- 3. Who is a friend or family member who is courageous?
- 4. Who is someone in the media (e.g., a celebrity) who is courageous?
- 5. Who is a friend or family member who is responsible?
- 6. Who is someone in the media (e.g., a celebrity) who is responsible?
- 7. Are you a courageous person? Why?
- 8. Are you a responsible person? Why?
- 9. Who was Rosa Parks and why was she courageous and responsible?
- 10. Who was Lou Gehrig and why was he courageous and responsible?

## **<u>Scenarios</u>:** What would you do?

- 1. There is a new student in your class in school. This student has just moved to the area and does not know anyone. Your friends do not like the student and refuse to speak to him/ her or to include him/her in their activities. What would you do?
- 2. As you are walking down the hallway in your school, you see another student ahead of you accidentally drop a twenty dollar bill on the floor. What would you do? Does it make a difference whether the student comes from a rich or poor family?
- 3. One of your friends is a very popular student but lazy academically. He wants you to write a book report for him. He needs to get a B on the report in order to remain eligible to play school sports. With his athletic ability, your school may win the state championship. What would you do?
- 4. Everyone in your class will be divided into two basketball teams. You are the captain of one of those teams. One student in the class has some physical limitations and cannot move as quickly as the other students. You and the captain of the other team will take turns choosing the players on your teams. What would you do about the student with the physical limitations?

# <u>Writing/Speaking Assignments</u>: Students either may write a paper or give an oral presentation about the topic (length and guidelines to be determined by the teacher).

- 1. Discuss someone you know (or know of) who is or was courageous.
- 2. Discuss someone you know (or know of) who is or was responsible.
- 3. Define courage in your own words and give examples to explain your definition.
- 4. Define responsibility in your own words and give examples to explain your definition.
- 5. Who is your role model for courage?
- 6. Who is your role model for responsibility?
- 7. Interview your family members and/or friends and ask them to define courage and responsibility and to tell you about one time when they acted in a courageous and/or responsible manner.
- 8. Discuss a time in your life when you were courageous and/or responsible and how your actions made you feel.
- 9. Discuss a time in your life when you were <u>not</u> courageous and/or responsible and how your actions made you feel.
- 10. Discuss why courage and responsibility are important in our society today.
- 11. Write a nonfiction or fiction story about courage and/or responsibility.

- 12. Write a poem or song about courage and/or responsibility.
- 13. Select one of the quotes about courage or responsibility below and explain what it means. Or, find a quotation about courage or responsibility and explain what it means. Identify the author of the quote and describe who that individual is (e.g., Abraham Lincoln, 16<sup>th</sup> President of the United States).
